As we prepare to change the clocks this month, it is a good time to check and change the batteries in your smoke detectors, CO2 detectors, remote controls, and electronic locks.

Maintenance Minute

Your diligence has been paying off in regards to keeping your heat up, cabinet doors open and shutting the water off. We still have the potential for cold weather, so keep up the good work.

Quick reminder-when having work done in your town-

home or condo-ALWAYS use a licensed and insured contractor.

Pest prevention-keep mice and critters out by not letting tempting treats to attract them. Also, moth balls in your storage closets, sheds, etc., will definitely deter them.

If you have an individual water heater in your condo or townhouse, please give it a routine 'once over'. Just to make sure it is not leaking, rusting, etc.

Replace Your Smoke Alarms

Why Replace Smoke Alarms Every 10 Years?

Why should smoke alarms be replaced every decade? And why does my smoke alarm's warranty only cover 10 years of operation?

Like most electronics, smoke alarms don't last forever. The US National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) issued NFPA Standard 72, National Fire Alarm and Signalling Code (2010 edition), which states:

"Replace all smoke alarms, including those that use ten-year batteries and hard-wired alarms, when they are ten years old or sooner if they don't respond properly when tested."



Each smoke detector should be replaced 10 years after the date of installation. If you're not sure when it was installed, check the back of the smoke detector for the manufacture date and add 10 years to it to get the expiration or replacement date. Most CO alarms expire after 7 years, so if you have a combo smoke and CO detector, you should replace it every 7 years.

Dangers with Air-Fryers

SAFETY NOTICE ON USING AIR FRYERS

Wondering about other fire safety issues associated with air fryers? As it turns out, there are several to consider. One important one is to give your air fryer plenty of ventilation space to help with air circulation and eliminate heat. You want to place it at least five inches away from the wall; failing to do so can result in a fire hazard. "To prevent insufficient ventilation and any heat marks appearing on your walls and ceilings from rising fumes, it's crucial to leave enough space around these appliances when in use," Jen Nash, Design Excellence Manager at Magnet, told Bracknell News. It's also wise to use aluminum foil sparingly in air fryers. Never put a foil-lined basket in an air fryer without food on top to weigh it down since it can be sucked into the air intake and possibly start a fire.

Air fryers left plugged in when not in use have been associated with a number of kitchen fires.

For example, according to WPXI News, one homeowner in Pennsylvania came home to a smokey kitchen, which was started by a plugged-in, but turned-off, air fryer. Another homeowner in South Carolina posted on Facebook how her kitchen burned down when a power surge ignited her small appliance. Those catastrophes could have been avoided if the air fryers had simply been unplugged after they were used.

There are some other crucial fire safety precautions to think about, too, including proper ventilation and heeding recall notices. Here is what to keep in mind if you have one of these appliances at home.
